The Management of Holy Cross College organized two-day staff orientation program for the academic year 2023-2024 on 14th and 15th June 2023. It was held in our Lady's Hall. The first day orientation program commenced with an inspiring prayer service by Dr.I.Antonitte Vinoline and Dr.J.Merline Vinotha from the Department of Mathematics, Holy Cross College, Tiruchirappalli.

Mother Superior, Rev. Sr. Lilly Mary David introduced the new Principal Rev. Sr. Dr. Isabella Rajakumari who took charge from this academic year. Rev.Sr. Dr. Anne Xavier, the Secretary of Holy Cross College, Tiruchirappalli, welcomed the new Principal Rev. Dr. Sr. Isabella Rajakumari, with a bouquet.

"A bouquet of flowers is our way of expressing our gratitude and respect". Sister Principal welcomed the new Dean of Research, Dr. W. Ritha, Asst. Prof. of Mathematics and thanked the former Dean of Research, Dr. Swarnakumari, Asso. Prof. of Rehabilitation Science, with bouquets of flowers.

The session began with the welcome address given by Dr.M. Mary Mejrullo Merlin, HoD of Mathematics.Dr. F. Sagayaraj Francis, Professor, Department of Computer Science and Engineering, Head, Department of Management Studies, Puducherry was the Resource Person for the orientation program.

He delivered a speech on "Changing and Challenging Education Scenario in India". He enlightened the staff on the importance and development of Higher Education. According to him, teachers play an incredible role in world development, so every teacher should be aware of and work towards producing the significance of our future world and that change is the only permanent thing, so feel it. He explained the system for evaluating higher education between 2014 and 2020.

In his presentation, he explained the differences between Bloom's Taxonomy and Outcome-Based Education, since both are two different frameworks with two different goals.

As a result of attending the session, all staff gained a better understanding of Bloom's Taxonomy and Outcome-Based Education. After the vote of thanks given by Ms. Jone Jayashree, Asst. Prof. of Mathematics, the meeting came to anend.

The second day of the orientation for staff was held on 15thJune 2023 at 9.30 a. m in Our Lady's Hall. Our Secretary, Dr. (Sr.). Anne Xavier and the Principal Dr. (Sr.) Isabella Rajakumari were present. The orientation started with a prayer. Ms. Benita, Assistant Professor of English delivered the Welcome Address.

The chief guest of the morning session Dr. Joseph Durai Raj, Professor of English, Gandhigram Rural Institute (Deemed to be University), Gandhigram, Dindigul addressed the gathering. He gave a detailed lecture on Disciplinary, Interdisciplinary, Multidisciplinary and Trans-disciplinary aspects for integrated research. He insisted that either the syllabus or the students must do interdisciplinary projects or courses for the improvement of collaborative learning. The staff members dispersed for a short break.



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In the second session, Prof. Joseph Durai Raj enlightened the staff members on academic integrity and research ethics. He listed 25 ways in which the researchers are committing plagiarism and suggested methods to promote academic integrity. The morning session ended at 1.00 p.m with the Vote of Thanks proposed by Dr. Eileen Brisha, Assistant Professor of English.

The afternoon session commenced with the prayer song followed by the welcome address delivered by Dr. V. Priya, Assistant Professor of Chemistry. The resource person for the afternoon session was Dr. Gnanakumar, Head, Department of Physical Chemistry and Additional Coordinator of RUSA -2.0, Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai. He gave an enlightening talk on the topic "Intricacies and their solutions for advancing the innovative technology research initiatives".

He emphasized the importance of environmentally benign energy devices and their applications. He clearly explained innovation management and how to convert basic research into applied research with the help of fuel cells. He also provided insight into the usage of updated technology in research and evolution of innovative technologies. He briefed them on the various funding agencies available for research. The programme ended with the vote of thanks proposed by Dr. M. Stella Bharathy, Assistant Professor of Chemistry.

An Invited lecture on "Resilience" was given on 25th August 2023 between 9 am and 12.30 pm for the teaching staff in the age group 45 to 60 years. The meeting began with a prayer led by the staff of Zoology department. Dr Avila Jerley, Assistant Professor of Zoology welcomed the distinguishing gathering.

The resource person of the lecture was Antony M Dsouza, President, DNV Americas, Houston, Texas. He began his lecture by congratulating all the scientists who contributed to the successful launch of Chandrayaan 3 in the south pole of the moon. Next, he shared his journey from SIT, Tiruchirappalli to DNV, Houston, with the gathering. The speaker briefed the audience about the qualities of a good leader; he emphasized that the leader's focus should be to lose himself in the service of others. The speaker said, when one gets up in the morning, one should get up with a purpose; have a mission and vision for one's life.

He added that as a teacher, one should master the subject, influence the students entrusted to oneself by winning their trust through the character, competence and compassion of the teacher. He pointed out that what our students need in today's situation is equity and not equality, we should show equity depending upon the need of every student in the class. He supported his statements through powerful videos and animations. He concluded by saying resilience is the cumulation of wellbeing (physical, social and mental) and motivation(autonomy, mastery and purpose) in an individual's life. The lecture came to an end with the vote of thanks by Dr. Sujatha Ilangovan, Assistant Professor of Zoology.



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Orientation Program for New Staff

On 8th September 2023, the IQAC Coordinator, along with the Academic Deans, organized an orientation program for the newly recruited staff. The orientation program began with a prayer, followed by the welcome address by Dr. Horne Iona Averal, IQAC Coordinator, who welcomed all the Deans and Teachers.

The first session was conducted by Dr. Joicey P. Manickam, Dean of Rehabilitation and Behavioral Sciences, who provided an orientation on Revised Bloom's Taxonomy and action verbs. This session also highlighted the different levels of cognition and included examples of how to frame questions using the verbs in the six levels of cognition.

The second session was led by Dr. Margaret Suganthi, Dean of Media Studies and Fashion Design, who discussed various dimensions in framing questions using RBT and emphasized common mistakes to be avoided while framing questions.

The third session was conducted by Dr. Inigomary Rita, Dean of Physical Sciences, who provided guidance on methodologies for creating question banks and question papers. The session also covered the organization of questions into sections and provided an understanding of the letters and numbers used in subject codes. The fourth session was facilitated by Dr. Shanthi, Dean of Life Sciences, who focused on Program Outcomes, Course Outcomes, and the calculation of CO attainment levels.

The final session was handled by Dr. Leena, Dean of Mathematical and Computation Sciences. This session highlighted the importance of formatting a question paper and offered solutions to common mistakes made by teachers. At the end of the orientation program, a discussion platform was created, and all the teachers actively participated in clarifying their doubts.



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A Faculty Development Programme was organized by the management of the College for professors with less that 5 years of teaching experience on the 29th of September 2023, between 8:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m in Our Lady's Hall. The guest speaker of the day was Rev. Fr. V. Joseph Xavier SJ, Executive Director, St. Joseph's College Tiruchirappalli.

The FDP began with a prayer service lead by the Department of Commerce. Ms. A. Ann Esther Shiny, Assistant Professor, PG & Research Department of English delivered the Welcome Address. The first session was on the topic, "Students and Parents – Problems and Possible Solutions" Fr. Joseph enlightened the faculty on how students should be the focus of any educational institution that seeks to create a new world order by educating it's young minds. He spoke on the difficulties of students' phase of life because their outlook is different from that of the parents and teachers.

Fr. Joseph stressed on the importance of understanding and compassion on the part of the parents and teachers, to ensure a student's holistic development. He made the faculty contemplate on why students have to learn from teachers if they can more comfortably learn from the internet. So he taught the faculty not to be teachers but to be compassionate facilitators.

He made the faculty understand the four different types of student problems: Academic, Health, Personal or Family and Developmental Problems. He reinforced the ideology that a teacher should not work towards the completion of the syllabus, but towards the understanding of each student in his/her class.

The session resumed after a brief recess of 15 minutes and Fr. Joseph enlightened the faculty on the topic "Ubuntuism in the Classroom" — an African native ideology that promotes cooperation and collaboration in place of competition. He threw light on the fact that interdependence, inclusivity and intersubjectivity mark to be the pillars of any benchmark teacher. He opined that, teachers should motivate students to transcend their self-centeredness and find joy in shared success.

Fr. Joseph taught the dictum: "I am Because you are" which focuses on the fact that every human being has a part to play in the complex web of relationships through humane qualities like, compassion, trust, empathy, respect, tolerance and cooperation. He posited that the attitude:

"We are brothers and we forgive each other" seems to be missing in modern pedagogy. A teacher must employ an attitude in class which facilitates students who excel in different fields to come together and share their expertise in their respective fields, to entail holistic development and growing together.

The session was then open for queries which Fr. Joseph gladly answered. Around 100 faculty benefitted from the FDP, in which the Principal, Secretary, and the Vice-Principals took active part. The Vote of Thanks was delivered by Ms. Jayalakshmi, N, Assistant Professor, Department of Physics and the FDP came to a fruitful close.

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Internal Audit

The internal audit for various Schools within our institution Holy Cross College-Tiruchirappalli-2 was conducted from 24thto 30thNovember 2023. The audit aimed to assess the financial, operational and academic processes of each school to ensure compliance with established policies and procedures.

The audit team, comprised of Dr. Sr. Anne Xavier Secretary, Dr. Sr. Isabella Rajakumari, Principal, Dr. Sr. Sarguna, Finance Officer, the Deans of various Schools and the IQAC Coordinator, diligently examined each school's activities.

The internal audit revealed both strengths and areas for improvement across the Schools:

Financial Compliance:

Generally, financial transactions were well-documented and in compliance with established policies.

Academic Processes:

Most schools demonstrated effective academic program management. Some discrepancies in faculty records were identified and require rectification.

Infrastructure and Resources:

Facilities and resources in various schools were generally adequate. Minor issues were noted in the maintenance of certain laboratory equipment.

Regulatory Compliance:

Schools demonstrated a commitment to compliance with regulatory requirements, but some schools need to streamline their processes further.

Communication and Collaboration:

Inter-departmental communication and collaboration were identified as areas for enhancement.

Recommendations:

Implement a standardized system for faculty record-keeping to ensure accuracy and completeness. Conduct regular maintenance checks on laboratory equipment to prevent operational disruptions. Strengthen inter-departmental communication channels to foster collaboration and information sharing. Provide additional training on regulatory compliance to relevant staff members. Thus the internal audit served as a comprehensive evaluation of our institution's Schools, identifying strengths and areas for improvement. The recommendations provided aim to enhance overall efficiency, compliance and collaboration. The audit team appreciates the cooperation of all stakeholders during the evaluation process. This report is submitted in adherence to the principles of transparency, accountability and continuous improvement within our institution.

Additionally, she underscored the imperative of regular review and adaptation of these outcomes to keep pace with advancements in the field, ensuring the relevance and effectiveness of educational programmes.

The orientation programme provided valuable insights into the strategic refinement of POs, PSOs, and COs, and their alignment with the overarching goals of academic programmes. Dr. Brindha's expertise and guidance have undoubtedly contributed to fostering a culture of excellence and continuous improvement in curriculum development and educational practices within the institution.



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Dr. N.V. Varghese's Presentation on NEP

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Orientation on Invigilation Procedures and Vigilance Processes for Teaching Staff with Less Than 5 Years of Experience

On 26th March 2024, in Regina's Hall, Holy Cross College (Autonomous), Tiruchirappalli, an orientation session was conducted by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) Coordinator, Dr. Horne Iona Averal, Holy Cross College(Autonomous) Tiruchirappalli to educate teaching staff with less than five years of experience about invigilation procedures and vigilance processes. The session aimed to enhance their understanding and adherence to academic integrity standards during examination periods. Invigilation Procedures:

The invigilator must arrive at the examination venue at least 15minutes before the scheduled start time. Invigilators should familiarize themselves with the examination rules and regulations set by the institution.

Ensure the seating arrangement is appropriate and there are no unauthorized materials on the desks.

Maintain vigilance throughout the examination to prevent any form of malpractice.

Handle any disturbances or irregularities promptly and professionally.

Collect and secure examination materials after the allotted time has elapsed.

Vigilance Processes:

Monitor students' behavior and activities during the examination to detect any signs of cheating or misconduct.

Report any suspicious behavior or incidents to the appropriate authorities immediately.
