- Seventeen extension activities have been included in the curriculum under Part –VI, with 1 credit for the under graduate students (in the 1^{st} and 2^{nd} year for 120 hours).
- The skill based certificate course for the 1st UG and PG students has been a maiden venture to impart skill based training to the students admitted in June 2017. 47 trainers trained 1875 students in 19 value added /career oriented skill- based courses.



4.2 Computerization of administration and library:


